History: Pope Paul II canonically established the Society of Jesus or Jesuits in 1540, which St. Ignatius of Loyola (1491-1556) and others had founded in France in 1534. Pope Clement XIV, acting under duress, suppressed the society in 1773 and Pope Pius VII restored it in 1814. The Jesuits have administered the following provinces, which have included Indian missions and parishes in the United States:
