History: The Associated Archives at St. Mary's Seminary & University opened in 2002 with the archival holdings of the Archdiocese of Baltimore (est. 1789), St. Mary's Seminary & University (est. 1791), and the Associated Sulpicians of the United States (U.S. Province est. 1903).

Reverend Edward R. Dyer, S.S. (1854-1925) and Reverend John B. Tenny, S.S. (1890-1981), two notable Sulpicians, served as secretaries of the Commission for the Catholic Missions among the Colored People and the Indians (Washington, D.C.), 1884-1925 and 1925-1976, respectively.

Holdings of Catholic-related records about Native Americans:

Inclusive dates: 1875-1919, n.d.

Volume: Approximately 1.8 cubic feet

Description: The Reverend Dyer Papers include records pertaining to the Commission for the Catholic Missions among the Colored People and the Indians, which are believed to be the records about Native Americans. Marquette University (Milwaukee, Wisconsin) holds copies of these records within the Bureau of Catholic Indian Missions Records.
